Senator calls for attention on road network

BUJA-SENATOR (PDP, Ogun East) has expressed concern over what he called the increasing accident rate on the Lagos-Ibadan expressway and demands com-mensurate attention on the nation's network of intercountry roads as given air travel.

Speaking against the back-ground of Monday's acci-dent on the expressway that claimed the lives of seven aides of Governor Rasheed Ladoja of Oyo State, Senator Ogunbanjo regretted that the authorities had seemingly failed to respond to the grav-ity of the situation of that road which he claimed was consuming blood on a regu-

While appreciating the concern of the authorities and stakeholders on the need to improve the safety of air travel following the crash of Bel-lview Flight 210, Ogunbanjo said that it, however, re-mained a fact that road accidents consumed more lives than air mishaps all over the

"That road is terrible and I believe that something urgent needs to be done about it, Senator Ogunbanjo told Vanguard in a telephone inter-view yesterday, "That road is a death trap

and it is more ironical that it is an important linkage be-tween most sections of the country and the nation's com-

mercial nerve centre.
"The road which should ordinarily have been a two lane expressway is now virtually a single lane in critical sections and the situation is compounded by trailers and trad-ers who fence off portions of the road, in fact it is no longer an expressway," he said. Harping on the need to

boost safety standards on the roads to the level given air travel in the country, the law-

I still believe that air travel is still the safest means of travelling all over the world. The number of fatalities from air crashes is infinitesimal to the fatalities that accrue from ad mishaps."
"If you check the number of

casualties from air crashes in a whole year you will see that we lose more than that from the accidents that happen on our expressways in a month I agree that efforts should be made to make air travel safer. but closer attention should be paid to road travel. More people travel by road than by air and this should compel the authorities to make our roads safer. Particularly the Lagos-lbadan expressway, it is undulating, curves here and there, it is a death trap, Sen-ator Ogunbanjo concluded.

"We are disturbed by the apparent slow pace of the prosecution of indicted public officials in our court sys-

tem," the network added. While commending the progress so far made by the EFCC, the network expressed regret over the inability of the commission to prosecute some officials involved in corrupt related offences.

Chairmen, board members are part-time appointees - Ekaette

A BUJA—SECRETARY to the Government of the Federation (SGF), Chief Ufot Ekaette, yesterday is-sued a code of conduct to all appointed members of Boards of Federal Government par-astatals, warning them

of Federal Government par-astatals, warning them against usurping the func-tions of the chief executives. Chief Ekactte gave the charges in Abuja during the inauguration of the board of six parastatals under his purview, which include Federal Road Safety Commission (FRSC), National Salaries, Incomes and Wages Commis-sion, Utilities Charges Com-mission, National Commission for Refugees, National Lottery Regulatory Commission and National Lottery Trust Fund Board of Trustees.

According to him, "experi-ence over the years has shown that there are always problems in the relationship between boards and the par-astatals as well as the super-vising ministry/office.

I, therefore, intend to high-light some of the issues in order to insulate you from the experiences of the past and draw attention to what you should be familiar with, if only to engender team work, cooperation and harmonious working relationship between the boards, the management of the parastatals and my of-

"Chairmen and members of the Board are part-time appointees. They should not assume full-time and executive functions, which are re-

sponsibilities of the chief executives. In other words, they should not interfere in the day-to-day running of the parastatals, but should provide policy guidelines for the smooth operation of the par-astatals."

He said, "where the enabling laws provide for full-time Chairman and Commissioners, the role of the Director-General/Secretary as the Ac-counting Officer should be so recognised in order to avoid constant friction be-

tween the Chairman and the operating officer." Chief Ekaette who noted that, "the Chief Executives and management staff of par-astatals are guided by Public Service Rules, Financial Regulations and Extant circula in the performance of their functions," added that "Board members should as much as possible familianse

themselves with rules, regulations or extant circulars, so as to guard against unintended situations of issuing in-structions or demands which extant rules and regulations do not support and which public servants will find difficult to comply with, thus run-ning the risk of crosion of their

authority."

He explained, "on the other hand, the Chief Executives of parastatals and their manage-ment staff must place the to tality of their knowledge and expertise at the disposal of their Board members so that their Board members so that the system is made proactive in terms of preventing the Board from taking faulty de-cisions or making irregular demands."

According to him, "the approved channel of communication between the Board and the parastatals is the Chief Executive.

The University of Jos announces the availability of two scholarships, each of up to three years duration, tenable by young persons who either wish to do, are currently doing, or have recently completed a Ph.D. The scholarships, whose purpose is to assist the awardees to enhance their scademic skills and qualifications and to build up their network of academic colleagues, will support carefully designed and supervised projects of research, writing, presentation at conferences, and publication. Applications are invited for awards under this programme.

The sponsor is the Volkswagen Foundation of Hannover, Germany, under its new funding initiative on "Knowledge for Tomorrow Cooperative Research Projects in Sub-Saharan Africa." An award has been made under this initiative to the University of Jos and five partner universities in Sudan. Kenya, Zanzibar, South Africa, and Germany. The title of the project under which the award was made is "Sharia Debates and Their Perception by Christians and Muslims in Selected African Countries."
